Joy is survived by her husband, Daniel Mason; daughter, Jacqueline (John Sorensen) Mason; brother, Chuck Marburger; sister, Judy Marburger; best friend, Esther Petrelli-Massey;

Joy completed her undergraduate degree in Biology at Allegheny College. She went on to complete her doctoral studies in Agronomy and Plant Genetics at the University of Maryland. She built a successful career centered around environmental science and research. Most recently, Joy provided environmental services inclusive of land restored to historic conditions and scientific research while employed by the St Johns River Water Management District (Palatka, FL) and Indiana Dunes National Park (Porter, In). She was a passionate advocate for science and the environment and engaged in both local and international science community outreach.

Joy taught science and art in Sierra Leon, West Africa during her time with the Peace Corps. She was a traveler and sought out new experiences and learning opportunities. She was also an avid birder, and loved photography, capturing the flora and fauna around her home and during her travels.
